OV Winery One Of Five Locales For 'Sculpture In Public Places'

A series of five large outdoor sculptures will make a biannual rotation to area locations as part of the Sculpture In Public Places Program, through Sculpture Trails Outdoor Museum in [Solsberry](#). Fittingly, the first to be located at the Owen Valley Winery is a large, 'O' and 'V' crafted from a ton of steel by Royal British Sculptor Pam Brown, entitled "Surveyor."

An unveiling of the piece took place Sunday afternoon at the winery, led by [Spencer](#) artist James Brown of the Owen County [Art](#) Guild, Sculpture Trails' Gerry Masse and Richard Rome, sculptor and fellow of the Royal College of Art in [London](#).

The winery's Anthony Leaderbrand said he and his family recognize the value of the arts.

"We are honored to be involved in such a positive program that will help expose more wonderful destinations in southern [Indiana](#) via this Sculpture in Public Places [Art](#) Trail," he noted. "We feel like our partnership with the Owen County Art Guild has been wonderful. This is one of five pieces of art that have been recovered via a campaign to save art from the Museum of Steel Sculpture in the [United Kingdom](#)."

Among the area participants displaying the works of art from the Ironbridge Open Air Museum of Steel Sculpture are the Bloomfield Public Library and the Greene County Tulip Trestle.


“Pam Brown and her husband were sculptors who set up this open air museum of steel sculpture in Coalbrookdale, [England](#), incidentally where process for melting iron with coke was first invented around 1700,” Rome explained. “They built a studio and made sculptures there. Unfortunately, she had to close the museum, that’s why
